

INTRODUCTION OF THE TVET MATURITY DEVELOPMENT SUBCOMMITTEE

In January 2025, HEFMA launched the TVET Maturity Development Subcommittee, a strategic workgroup focused on transforming facilities management across all 50 South African TVET Colleges as well as colleges in the SADC region. This initiative marks a turning point for the sector, aiming to professionalise infrastructure development, improve organisational structures, and strengthen Facilities Management capacity.

The subcommittee's vision is to become the preferred support platform for TVET Colleges seeking best practices in infrastructure and facilities management. Its mission is to advance campus infrastructure, modernise FM operations, and build professional capacity across the sector.

The subcommittee is led by the Chairperson, Ms Swazi Dlamini (Central Johannesburg TVET College), with support from the Vice Chairperson, Ms Lerato Maloka (Goldfields TVET College) and the Secretary, Ms Thapelo Kekana (Waterberg TVET College)

The dynamic and regionally diverse team of professionals committed to transforming facilities management in the sector also include the following office bearers: Mr Fadiel Simmins (Northern Cape Rural TVET College), Mr Sibabalo Tywabi (Northlink TVET College), Ms Yanela Mlambo (Port Elizabeth TVET College), Mr Malibongwe Mpithi (King Hintsa TVET College) and Mr Khwatheleni Tshitangano (Tshwane North TVET College).

Together, they guide strategic planning, regional engagement, and progress reporting to HEFMA's Executive Committee and the Department of Higher Education & Training.

TVET professionals are encouraged to:

- Join monthly meetings
- Participate in benchmarking
- Share best practices and challenges

Key activities this year include a national appraisal of FM maturity, preparation of formal reports for HEFMA and DHET, and the presentation of results at the 2025 HEFMA Annual Conference. The subcommittee will also support institutions in tracking Energy Performance Certification progress and convene monthly workgroup meetings to share insights and strengthen collaboration.

This initiative shifts TVET Colleges away from reactive maintenance toward a structured, proactive approach to facilities management. It encourages shared learning, regional benchmarking, and coordinated problem-solving to elevate the entire sector.

The TVET Maturity Development Subcommittee is positioned to deliver lasting, sector-wide improvements. With clear direction, committed leadership, and strong stakeholder support, 2025 marks the beginning of a new era in higher education infrastructure.

The Global Discussion Board represents an exciting evolution of our long-standing strategic alliance with AUDE and fellow international partners APPA and TEFMA. This platform offers a space where professionals can connect, engage in meaningful dialogue, ask questions, and share innovative ideas real-world Whether and experiences. it's sustainability strategies, digital innovation, infrastructure resilience, or student-centric campus design, the board is designed to tackle shared challenges and explore new opportunities together.

The origin of this initiative is a testament to the power of professional networking. The idea was sparked by a serendipitous conversation between Mr Syd Cottle, Chair of AUDE and Director of Estates at the University of Liverpool, and Mr Lindokuhle Mzolo, Immediate Past President of HEFMA and Campus Maintenance Manager at the University of Johannesburg. Their conversation, which took place during the HEFMA 2023 Conference at the University of the Free State, planted the seed for what has now blossomed into a dynamic and inclusive global community.

Speaking on the launch, Mr Cottle remarked,

"Whilst this is a nice story, it's not necessarily about me and Lindo, it is about shining a light on the power and opportunities that arise through networking and collaboration. The story helps to tell this."

GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE: AUDE 2025 - CARDIFF, WALES

The AUDE 2025 Conference, held at Cardiff University in Wales, brought together visionary leaders from around the globe under the theme, "A Place Where We Feel We Belong". HEFMA's presence, through the leadership of President Hendrik Esterhuizen, signalled the growing influence of Southern African voices in global facilities management conversations. The conference explored how future universities, especially in the 2035–2050 horizon, are being shaped by social, technological, economic, environmental, and political trends. The dominant vision that emerged was one of a smaller, greener, more creative, and community-integrated campus. Spaces will no longer be rigid or fixed but modular, adaptable, and designed to foster human connection and creativity.

A strong focus was placed on energy efficiency and smarter maintenance strategies. It was alarming to note that more than 50% of university energy consumption often occurs while buildings are unoccupied. In response, presenters stressed the need to implement smart controls, occupancy-linked systems, and rigorous time management of facility operations. IoT sensors, environmental monitoring, and data integration are becoming critical tools to reduce carbon emissions while simultaneously enhancing indoor quality and cognitive performance.

Another key focus was the importance of using data as a strategic asset. Many institutions are "data-rich but insight-poor". Transforming raw information into powerful decision-making tools through integrated platforms like Power BI and combining datasets on energy, space utilisation, student experience, and building performance will redefine how we plan and operate campuses. Presenters also emphasised the need to build data competency among FM teams, so staff can not only collect data but also use it confidently to drive decisions.

AUDE also reminded us that shaping the future FM team must go beyond technical skills. Institutions must refine job descriptions, close skills gaps, embrace cross-functional collaboration, and attract younger generations such as Gen Z and Gen Alpha. These future professionals think differently, value digital inclusion, and need workspaces that reflect their always-connected, collaborative lifestyles.

Campus site visits were among the most inspiring parts of the trip. Cardiff University showcased open-plan buildings powered by battery trains and filled with natural light and flexible furniture. The University College London impressed with its heritage architecture coupled with smart central heating systems and design features promoting interaction. At the University of Hertfordshire, participants toured simulation labs, hacker zones, vehicle manufacturing sites, and sustainability-focused buildings. Each campus demonstrated how tradition and innovation can blend to create beautiful, efficient, and inclusive learning environments.

Ms Tshisevhe Nesengani, Head of the Infrastructure Maintenance Unit at the University of Venda, has been awarded the 2024 AUDE Summer School Best Project Award. As the HEFMA-sponsored delegate, she participated in the prestigious six-month international programme hosted at the University of Manchester, which brings together emerging leaders in higher education facilities management. Her team's project, titled "Enhancing Customer-Centric Practices in Capital Project Delivery within Higher Education Estates", was selected as the best among the 2024 cohort. The project focused on integrating the voice of students, staff, and service teams into capital project planning using global customer service frameworks such as ISO 9001 and Customer Service Excellence.

The group's innovative approach emphasised postoccupancy feedback, user-driven design, and data-informed service delivery to improve institutional performance and satisfaction. Their work culminated in strategic recommendations for AUDE and higher education leadership. In recognition of their achievement, Ms Nesengani and her team were honoured at the 2025 AUDE Conference Gala Dinner at Cardiff University. This accomplishment marks a significant milestone for both the University of Venda and HEFMA's ongoing efforts to elevate professional excellence across the Southern African facilities management community.

SAAMA 2025 Conference: Sharpening the Edge of Asset Management

The SAAMA 2025 Conference, hosted at the aha Gateway Hotel in Umhlanga on 12–13 June 2025, focused on sharpening the strategic and digital capabilities of asset management across sectors. Representing HEFMA, Ms Kubayi (President-Elect) and Mr Nonjabe (Assistant Director: Information Services) attended the event, which aligned perfectly with HEFMA's mission to lead innovation and resilience within higher education infrastructure.

Keynote speakers addressed the growing need for digital transformation and national collaboration in asset management. Presentations delved into Al integration for predictive maintenance, robotics in facilities operations, and leadership for the digital era. Educational institutions were called to embrace remaining useful life modelling, ISO-aligned maintenance, and sustainability models inspired by public-sector entities like Eskom and Transnet.

A standout insight for HEFMA was the potential use of digital twin technology to simulate space utilisation, emergency scenarios, and HVAC performance. The application of real-time condition monitoring, Al-powered diagnostics, and lifecycle costing models is increasingly relevant for managing complex university estates. HEFMA's delegates also engaged with SAAMA vendors, such as Collaborit, Yellotec, and Pragma, to explore future collaboration and possible campus pilot projects.

The conference made clear that higher education must not only keep up with best practices, it must lead with bold, data-driven, and student-centred asset management strategies.
